School Day: Settling in

School Times

Children should arrive at school for 8.40am and line up on the playground with their class teacher ready for an 8.50am start. The school day ends at 3.20pm.

Uniform

We have a smart but simple uniform that we require all pupils to wear. Parents/carers should ensure that their child has the correct uniform which comprises of: white shirt, black trousers or skirt with navy blue jumper or cardigan and a school tie. Year 6 children are issued with blazers. School uniform- including PE Kit- can be purchased from our supplier.

School Meals and Snacks

Children have the choice of either a hot nutritious school dinner or bringing a healthy packed lunch into school. The menus are available to view on our school app and are on display in school. Paper copies are also available on request.

Free School Meals

Children in Year 3 and above can qualify for free school meals if their family are in receipt of certain income related benefits. Your Child's Achievements

How will I know how my child is doing in school?

We value the part which parents and carers play in their child's learning and are committed to keeping parents informed regularly through updates on the curriculum and homework so that they are well informed to support their child's learning. Each year group provides parents and carers with details regarding the skills and content to be taught each term so that progression in skills is evident.

News

Our teachers make ongoing assessments of all children in order to help them better plan the next unit of work. At the end of Key Stage 2, children are assessed in the core subjects by their teachers and by Standard Assessment tests (SATs) against the requirements in the National Curriculum. At the end of the academic year, parents will receive information on their child's progress as well as school results.

Parent Evenings

We offer a range of opportunities for parents to see and hear feedback on their child's progress. We also hold pupil progress meetings when we meet with parents on a more formal basis to discuss their child's progress and keep them informed about the school curriculum.

School Reports

We provide all parents with an annual written report from the class teacher at the end of the summer term. This provides information about your child's academic achievement and summarises their personal and social development. You are welcome to arrange to see the teacher at other times if you have particular questions.



Working With Parents

Parental Involvement

We believe that school is successful when it works in partnership with people and organisations that can enhance the quality of education it provides. The most important partnership is with parents. Children make maximum progress when home and school work closely together. We have an 'open door' policy and welcome parents into school to talk to staff, to work in classrooms or to help support activities.

Parent Volunteers

We value the contribution of parents and we actively encourage your help during the school day. Parents and family help with a variety of activities which include reading with our children, helping with events, activities and acting as an extra pair of hands on educational visits.

Helping to Support Children's Learning at Home

Home learning supports learning in class and is set according to children's ability. Homework also provides a link between home and school which allows parents to directly support the work of the school. Race Leys has always encouraged children to take books home to share with parents. However, we also encourage children to complete specific activities at home. These mainly focus on Literacy and Numeracy skills and topic work.

At Key Stage 2 homework provides a further opportunity for children to develop independent learning skills and hopefully this will become its main purpose. Children need to develop confidence, self-discipline and good learning habits, to enable them to study on their own. In addition to reading, literacy, numeracy and science tasks, children will be encouraged to research project work.

Issues Concerning Children's Welfare

If you are concerned about any aspect of your child's schooling the first step is to speak to the class teacher. If it is confidential or a complex matter, please do not try to deal with it immediately before or after school but ask to see the teacher at a suitable time.

Frequently Asked Questions

Here are our answers to what we find, are the most frequently asked questions. If you have any questions that are not answered here, please contact the school office who will be happy to help.

School Attendance

At Race Leys Junior School we believe that children learn effectively if they attend school regularly. The staff work with parents and carers to ensure each pupil attends regularly and punctually and is collected on time. School education lays the vital foundations of a child's life. Research clearly demonstrates the link between regular attendance and educational progress and attainment.

When attendance falls below 70% we are required to make a referral to the ACE (Attendance, Compliance & Enforcement) Team. We will then work together with the family to ensure that attendance improves.

Illness

If you suspect that your child is unwell please do not send them in to school.

Some illnesses are infectious and the must stay at home. Children must always stay at home for a full 48 hours after any illness that includes yomiting and/or diarrhoea.

Reporting your child's absence

Parents may contact the school by telephone or in person on the first day of any absence with an explanation for their child's absence. Text messages are sent to parents on the first day of absence if they have not contacted us.

Holidays

Headteachers can no longer authorise absence for holidays in term time. It should be remembered that this is a Government led directive. Children are required to attend school for 38 weeks each year, leaving 14 weeks to attend family holidays and we give plenty of advance notice relating to forthcoming School holiday dates and end of Key Stage Assessment dates.

Request for Absence

If you are considering leave within term time please put the request in writing and addressed to the Head of School stating the exceptional circumstances. Applications must be made in advance and failure to do so will result in the absence being unauthorised.

Medical Appointments

If your child needs to leave school during the day for a medical appointment, please notify the school by telephone. The school may also request sight of the appointment card or letter; but wherever possible these appointments should be arranged for outside school hours.

Jewellery

Jewellery, other than watches and small studs for pierced ears, are not permitted.

Internet Safety

Race Leys Junior School has an online safety policy which explains how we try to keep pupils safe in schools and how we respond to online safety incidents. Pupils are taught about online safety throughout the curriculum. The school has a designated online safety coordinator.



Frequently Asked Questions

Charging Policy

School Trips

When organising school trips, the school may invite parents to contribute to the cost of the trip. All contributions are voluntary. If we do not receive sufficient voluntary contributions, it may be necessary to either subsidise or cancel a trip.

Materials, books and equipment

Text books and other materials are provided by the school. Charges may be made for any materials, books, instruments or equipment where a parent wishes their child to own them. If school materials or equipment is damaged, parents will be asked to pay for the cost of such damage.

Residential Visits

A charge may be made to cover accommodation and transport. Participation in the Residential visits will be on the basis of parental choice and a willingness to meet the charges. Parents are given the opportunity to pay in instalments.





Support for Payments

In order to remove financial barriers form disadvantaged pupils, the Governing body has agreed that some activities and visits where charges can be made legally, will be offered at no charge or a reduced charge to parents in particular circumstances.

When attendance falls below 70% we are required to make a referral to the ACE (Attendance, Compliance & Enforcement) Team. We will then work together with the family to ensure that attendance improves.

Safeguarding

Race Leys Junior School is committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and expects all staff and volunteers to share in this commitment. Staff work hard to maintain an environment where children feel safe and secure.

The curriculum is designed to ensure opportunities for children to develop the skills they need to recognise and stay safe from abuse.

'Under the Education Act 2002 (Section 175), schools must make arrangements to safeguard and promote the welfare of children.
Parent/carers should know that the law (Childrens Act 1989) requires all school staff to pass on information which gives rise to a concern about a child's welfare including risk from neglect,physical,emotional or sexual abuse.

Behaviour and Self Development

Happy, Productive and Successful

We strongly believe that a happy, productive and successful school relies on a set of agreed values and high expectations of behaviour. Pupils are encouraged to be independent in making choices and are sensitively guided when problems arise.



Achievements Celebrated

All achievements are celebrated and all pupils are made to feel valued. Values are principles that drive behaviour. They influence our actions and attitudes and become our framework for living. They influence our relationship with ourselves and others.

We have a responsibility to help children understand that they have choices about how to behave and help them develop the strategies to make appropriate choices.

Our aim is to create an environment where children feel valued, safe and motivated to learn. We know that children respond best to praise and encouragement. We look for every opportunity to praise children when they are showing appropriate behaviour.

Rewards

House Tokens

House tokens can be issued to any pupils at any time for demonstrating the school values. These are collated on a School House basis. The winning team is announced in the Achievement Assembly with the winning House at the end of a term will receive the Head of School's treat.





Inclusion

Special Educational Needs

Children are assessed according to levels of needs and targets set,monitored and reviewed considering the progress made. Where necessary, time focused interventions are put in place to address any identified barrier. If the child still does not make accelerated progress, parental consent will be sought for school to liaise with external agencies, e.g. Educational Psychologists, Early Intervention Service, Speech and Language Therapy, IDS, CAMHS for advice and assessment.

Following discussions with parents and carers, pupils may be placed onto the SEN register at some point in their school career. For many, this involves a short burst of targeted intervention which may lead to them being removed again, while for others the support process is a longer one. In all cases our aim is to provide the very best education for pupils, allowing all children to fully achieve their potential.

Parental Involvement and Partnerships

Parents are consulted regularly at the termly parent consultations and review discussison. Phone and email contact is maintained which ensures that difficulties and anxieties can be resolved swiftly. School Agency Partners include: Education Psychologists, Child Development Centre, Child and Adult Mental Health Service, Speech and Language Therapy, Occupational Health, Physiotherapy Service, Social Communication, Outreach Service, Hearing Sensory Support, Visual Sensory support, learning difficulties and disabilities.

Gifted and Talented Children

We recognise that all children are individuals with their own specific needs, gifts and talents. Children who are indentified as being exceptionally able or talented are monitored and provided with stimulating and enriching lessons, challenges and opportunities approapriate to their needs.

The Board ensures that progress is underpinned with the highest standards of compliance with our regulators so that public funding is well-used. GST Governors meet formally every thirteen weeks and much of the real work is done between these meetings, through working groups and individual contributions to the school's life according to each governor's skills and the needs of the school.
