Overview

Race Leys Junior School aims to make use of the sports premium funding in order to raise the standard of teaching in PE and to offer a wide range of experiences and activities to all children regardless of their level of sporting ability. We recognise the contribution of PE to the health and well-being of children and believe that an innovative, varied PE curriculum and co-curricular opportunities have a positive influence on the concentration, attitude and academic achievement of all of our children.

Key achievements to date:

- Our three-year data analysis shows an average increase of 13% of children who are now meeting the expected standard in PE across the school
- Sporting successes have been celebrated, such as our girls football team winning the local tournament and our inclusive archery team also reaching the regional finals.
- Co-curricular clubs have a high uptake, with 86% of children having accessed a club throughout this year.
- Links established with the local boxing and dance academy, who have both delivered activities within school.
- Investment in the complete PE scheme has further enhanced the curriculum across the school.
- Vast improvements in Sport and PE have led to the school being awarded the SportsMark Silver award, with many elements judged to be at the gold standard.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- Introduce strategies and activities to enable our most able pupils to achieve the highest standards in PE and Sport (co-curricular academies).
- Develop and encourage more competitive sport in school and across schools (inter and intra sport).
- Develop further links with external sports clubs.
- Devise co-curricular offer to encompass views of pupils and encourage 100% participation.
- Work in liaison with parents and health agencies to promote the health and well-being of all pupils.
- Swimming Lessons will be brought in house during the next academic year through the hiring of a temporary pool.
